THE BORLEY RECTORY

The tiny parish of Borley is located at hardly populated east coast of England. This house would be quickly forgotten if not for the fact it's been known as "The Most Haunted House in England".

A man called Harry Price got involved in the case of investiogation after the newspaper article, which contained a story about the phantoms in the House. It told about different types of phenomena that had been reported there, like the phantoms of girls in white, headless men, the sounds of footsteps, ghostly whispers, strange lights, the phantom of the builder of the House, and the spirit of nun. Her figure was seen crossing the garden.

Local legend had it that a monastery had once been located on the site and that a 13th century monk and a beautiful young novice were killed while trying to elope from the place. The monk was hanged and his would-be bride was bricked up alive within the walls of her convent. These events drew attention to the fact of apparition of a ghostly nun in the House.

Price's investigations in the rectory proved much of those facts that were told about it. He reported of the bell ring, objects being moved; the accounts from



the neighbors and previous tenants of the house who witnessed the same phenomena at that mystical rectory.

At first, when the original tenants of the House were living in it, the ghosts were peaceful. But in October 1930 when they were replaced by the Reverend Lionel Foyster and his wife, Marianne, the level of paranormal activity in the rectory increased. People were locked out of rooms, household items disappeared, windows were broken, furniture moved, and strange sounds were heard much and much more. The worst incidents involved Mrs. Foyster, who was thrown out of bed, forced heavy objects being thrown at her, was slapped by the invisible hands and once was almost suffocated with a mattress.
